

Finnish Parents' Expectations of Independence of Their Children

Age	What should the child be able to do independently?
7	Dress oneself in outdoor clothing
8	Wear clean clothes and take dirty ones to the laundry basket
8	Take care of morning activities and arrive at school on time
9	Shop at the neighborhood grocery store
9	Take care of one's own homework for school
9	Go alone to a football practice (or other) about a mile away
10	Carry all necessary sports gear to school
11	Go to see the dentist alone
11	Babysit a younger sibling, who's two years younger, for a couple of hours
12	Care for your favorite pet, which includes cleaning out its cage
13	Start earning money to cover your own expenses

How was trust in teachers built?

Finland

System: Light administration that relies on clear professional responsibilities and mutual trust as the key drivers.

School: Collective autonomy and trust in schools to make key decisions regarding curriculum, pedagogy and assessment.

Teachers: Highly trusted profession that is collectively responsible for all aspects of teaching and learning in schools.



Australia


System: Heavy administration that is designed on consequential accountability and control as the key drivers.

School: Administrative autonomy and compliance regarding teaching and learning through centrally mandated regulations.

Teachers: Closely controlled profession that is individually held accountable for the compliance with mandated teaching and learning standards.




Fact or Myth?

"The most important single factor in improving quality of education is teachers."

Teacher are important but...



"Teachers account for about 1% to 14% of the variability in test scores, therefore the majority of opportunities for quality improvement are found in the system-level conditions.


