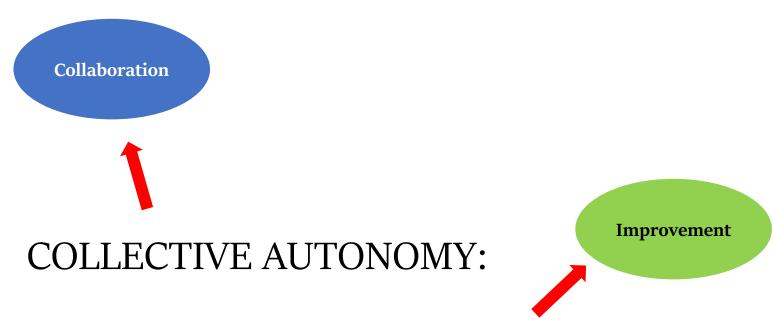


Teaching as profession

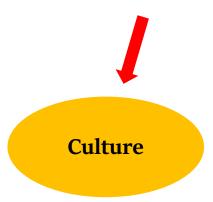


Freedom to make individual decisions and act in accordance with one's professional experience, knowledge, and judgement.





More freedom from bureaucracy, less autonomy from one another.



Professional autonomy is not about avoiding accountabilities.

It is:

- Building moral purpose and collective responsibilities
- Enhancing creative problem-solving and systems flexibility
- Protecting and strengthening the teaching profession

A: Through collective professionalism.

Q: How can schools cope with uncertainty?

A: Through flexibility, creativity, and autonomy.
